# Executive Summary

The Pallium Palliative Care Research Network (Red-InPal), established in 2019, was formed to enhance palliative care research in Argentina and Latin America through a collaborative, interdisciplinary, and internationally coordinated framework. From 2019 to 2025, the Network experienced a gradual consolidation, incorporating national and regional teams, engaging in competitive international consortia, and formulating a scientific agenda centered on five strategic priorities.

More than a mere collection of projects, the analyzed period illustrates the evolution of a robust network architecture, characterized by established methodological capabilities, consistent scientific output, and the cultivation of emerging researchers. The experience acquired from national and international funding opportunities enhanced technical standards and solidified connections with European and Latin American institutions.

The influence of the conducted work is evident not only in a multitude of indexed publications but also in its application to clinical practice, academic training, and the enhancement of regional dialogue regarding quality of care, collaborative planning, and the sustainability of health systems.

The 2026–2030 phase seeks to formalize this experience on a more structured regional platform, characterized by sustained competitive funding, the development of collaborative registries, and an enhancement of priority research areas.

This document provides a technical and strategic account of the 2019–2025 journey, emphasizing institutional insights and future projections, while offering a reflective and open-ended perspective on an ongoing process.



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## **Pallium Latin America Institute (Civil Association)**

**The Pallium Latin America Institute is an organization committed to the advancement and enhancement of palliative care in Latin America through professional training, research, and innovation in person-centered care models.**

**Since its inception, Pallium has championed initiatives designed to enhance the quality of care for individuals with advanced illnesses and their families, fostering educational programs, research endeavors, and opportunities for academic exchange at both regional and international levels.**

**The institution unites networks of professionals, universities, health organizations, and clinical teams to promote the advancement of palliative care, the enhancement of scientific knowledge, and the training of specialized human resources.**

**Within this institutional framework, the Palliative Research Network (Red-InPal) was established as a collaborative platform designed to enhance scientific output, foster cooperation among teams, and facilitate participation in both national and international research initiatives.**

# The source of a necessity

In recent decades, the advancement of palliative care in Latin America has demonstrated notable progress in clinical practice and education; however, research has evolved at a slower and more fragmented pace. Regional scientific output has been constrained by structural limitations, including inconsistent funding, inadequate inter-institutional collaboration, uneven international integration, and a still insufficient number of researchers specifically trained in the discipline.

In response to this situation, Pallium initiated the establishment of the InPal Network in 2019 as a collective effort to address this fragmentation. The network was founded on the belief that knowledge in palliative care must be cultivated not in isolation, but through open, dynamic, and horizontal collaborative frameworks.

The adopted model draws inspiration from the concept of "Network Thinking" [1], which is characterized as an open system of boundless connectivity, devoid of a rigid hierarchical center, and comprising nodes that enhance their strength through interconnection and knowledge sharing. In this context, the InPal Network was conceived to operate as a flexible structure, wherein scientific links foster new connections, amplify capacities, and facilitate the bidirectional flow of knowledge between Argentina, Latin America, and Europe.

# A networked architecture: Pallium Latin America as a coordinating hub

## Organizational framework

The **Red-InPal** Network was designed as a horizontal, dynamic, and flexible framework. In contrast to conventional centralised models, its architecture fosters the autonomy of participating nodes, interconnected through shared projects, common methodological standards, and collaborative academic output.

In this architecture, the **Red-InPal** Network serves as an articulating node, enabling:

- **Development of multicentric initiatives.**
- **Methodological and ethical alignment.**
- **Administrative oversight of funded initiatives.**
- **Collaboration with international consortia.**



## Geographical scope

The evolution of the network can be comprehended at three interrelated levels:

- National level: integration of public and private hospitals, national universities, and competitive funding programs such as those offered by the National Cancer Institute.
- Latin American level: collaboration with teams from diverse countries, development of regional multicenter studies, and participation in continental congresses.
- European and international level: engagement in projects financed by the European Union, international consortia, and ongoing academic collaborations.

Having established its architecture, it is essential to examine how that structure manifested in a tangible scientific agenda. The strategic lines outlined below are not discrete compartments; rather, they represent interconnected trajectories that arose from the network's inherent dynamics.

## Five lines that outline the scientific agenda

The consolidation of the **Red-InPal** Network cannot be attributed merely to the aggregation of isolated projects; rather, it is the result of the gradual development of a coherent, sustained, and cumulative scientific agenda. From 2020 to 2025, five strategic lines were established that interact with one another, facilitating a deeper understanding of the network's academic identity.

1. **The standard of end-of-life care**
2. **Understanding the experience of death within various cultural contexts**
3. **Shared decision-making**
4. **Innovating to revolutionise practice**
5. **Contemplating the system: the economics and sustainability of care**

# The standard of end-of-life care



From its inception, the InPal Network acknowledged that the advancement of palliative care necessitates robust evaluation tools. Improvement is unattainable without measurement. This research initiative concentrated on assessing the quality of both hospital and home care, especially during the final days of life (ERANet LAC CODE Project).

Participation in international consortia permitted:

- Adapt and validate instruments such as iCODE (Care of the Dying Evaluation) within Latin American contexts, specifically in Argentina, Uruguay, and Brazil.
- To aid in the establishment of an international Core Outcome Set aimed at optimizing care for individuals at the end of life.
- Examine the quality and benefit metrics of compassionate communities.
- Assess organizational models, including the PAMPA® Program for end-of-life care, in the context of its recognition as a Reference Center of the International Collaborative for the Best Care for the Dying Person since 2020.

The impact of this line was twofold: it positioned the InPal Network within international discussions regarding end-of-life assessment, while simultaneously facilitating feedback on local clinical practices through comparative evidence.



# Understanding the experience of death within various cultural contexts

Death and the dying process are profoundly connected to cultural, social, and familial dimensions. Participation in international multicenter studies has facilitated the inclusion of the Latin American perspective in comparative analyses across countries (iLIVE Project, Good Living, Good Dying).


Participation in international cohorts and studies conducted during the pandemic (CO-LIVE Study) expanded the understanding of:

- Expectations and preferences of patients during their final days of life.
- The significance of families in decision-making.
- Impact of health restrictions on the grieving process.
- Tensions between public policies and the humanization of healthcare.


This line integrated a qualitative and mixed production that enabled the emphasis of regional specificities within global comparative frameworks.

## Shared decision-making

Shared care planning has emerged as one of the most promising areas for future development. Following the establishment of the ACP-Argentina Group, studies were conducted to enhance informed decision-making in advanced diseases.

Key developments encompass:

- • Adaptation and validation of self-efficacy scales in collaborative planning.
- • Research in populations affected by Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis.
- • Investigation into health literacy concerning end-of-life issues within the community
- • Conceptual development regarding disease awareness and autonomy.

This line integrates psychometric methodology, qualitative research, and formative transfer, establishing itself as a key strategic pillar for the period 2026–2030.



# Innovating to revolutionise practice

Research conducted within the Red-InPal Network extended beyond the mere generation of descriptive knowledge; it also emphasised the creation of tangible tools aimed at enhancing clinical practice.

The following items were included:

- Implementation of tele-mentoring frameworks (ECHO-PAL).
- Development and assessment of digital applications for symptom management (App-AliviarTE).
- Curriculum development and assessment of training programs in palliative care (EDUPAL-Ar).
- This line of research reflects a commitment to applied research, wherein the knowledge produced has a direct influence on the organization of care.



## Contemplating the system: the economics and sustainability of care

The integration of economic analysis expanded the viewpoint from the individual level to encompass the entire health system. Assessing the budgetary implications and cost-effectiveness of palliative care interventions and informal care facilitated the framing of the discussion within the context of sustainability.

- Research was undertaken on:
  - Economic implications of informal caregiving.
  - Cost-effectiveness evaluations.
  - Budgetary analysis within public subsectors.

This statement enhances the ability to shape public policies and establishes the **Red-InPal** as a significant participant in discussions regarding the advancement of palliative care systems in the region.

The strategic guidelines delineate the components of the scientific agenda. The subsequent step involves analysing how this agenda was manifested in academic output and what insights that output provides regarding the institutional maturation process.

# Scientific Production: From Participation to Leadership



The evolution of scientific output from 2019 to 2025 serves as a prominent indicator of the consolidation process within the **Red-InPal** Network. Initially, participation centred on integration into established international consortia; however, the network progressively adopted a more proactive role in formulating research questions, exercising regional leadership, and advancing methodological development.

## From integration to meaningful contribution

In the initial stage, involvement in international consortia enabled us to acquire experience in multicenter research characterized by significant methodological complexity. This phase was crucial to:

- Integrate global design and reporting standards.
- Incorporate local teams into consensus and validation procedures.
- Acquaint yourself with competitive financing frameworks.

Over time, the contribution evolved from merely collecting national data to engaging in active participation in:

- Formulating protocols.
- International Delphi methodologies.
- Comparative qualitative assessments.
- Development and cross-cultural adaptation of tools.

This transition signifies a move from a framework of “participant node” to one of “strategic scientific partner.”

## Methodological diversification and scholarly advancement

One of the defining characteristics of the 2019–2025 production period was its methodological diversity. The InPal Network did not limit its efforts to a singular design type; instead, it embraced a variety of approaches:

- International multicenter cohort studies.
- Qualitative inquiry
- Participatory Action Research
- Diverse designs.
- Delphi methodologies and organized consensus.
- Cross-cultural psychometric assessments.
- Economic evaluations (cost-effectiveness analyses and budget impact assessments).
- Implementation research.

This plurality embodies a thorough comprehension of end-of-life care, wherein the clinical aspect, subjective experience, institutional structure, and economic viability are addressed in a cohesive manner.

# Development of tools and conceptual frameworks

In addition to the number of publications, a significant contribution was the involvement in the development of tools that enhance the scientific infrastructure of the field.

Among them are:

- Instruments for evaluating the quality of end-of-life care.
- Core Outcome Sets for end-of-life care.
- Self-efficacy assessments in collaborative planning.
- Questionnaires for assessing the expenses associated with informal care.

Adapting and validating these instruments within Latin American contexts not only enhances their international applicability but also fortifies the generation of contextualized evidence.

## Continuity beyond initiatives

One indicator of institutional maturity is the ability to maintain scientific output beyond the formal duration of funded projects. The ongoing international collaborations, publications resulting from secondary analyses, and integration into post-project networks (e.g., legacy groups) illustrate that the InPal Network has progressed beyond its sole reliance on one-time funding opportunities. This continuity illustrates the establishment of a robust scientific community.

## Institutional metrics

To provide a quantitative assessment that complements the earlier qualitative analysis, it is proposed to consolidate the following indicators for the period 2019–2025.

The systematization of these indicators will facilitate a quantitative evaluation of a process that, in qualitative terms, already reflects academic consolidation and the potential for international integration. Academic consolidation cannot be comprehended solely through publications. The sustainability of a scientific network also hinges on its ability to train researchers and promote generational renewal.

## Educating researchers, shaping the future

Human capital development served as a structural emphasis. The incorporation of fellows, master's students, and doctoral candidates into competitive projects facilitated the enhancement of methodological skills, multicenter experience, and early scientific contributions.

The network fostered interdisciplinary mentoring, engagement in international conferences, and the establishment of specialized thematic subgroups. These foundational elements facilitated the emergence of a new generation of researchers equipped with international experience and advanced methodological expertise.

These indicators enable us to assess not only academic output but also the future sustainability of the scientific platform.

## Impact beyond the papers

Human capital development and scientific production attain their full significance only when they yield tangible impact. At this juncture, it is essential to assess how the knowledge generated has transcended the academic realm.

The endeavors of the **Red-InPal** Network extended beyond merely publishing articles or engaging in international conferences. A significant aspect of the value derived from this work is its ability to impact clinical practices, organizational processes, and educational environments. The primary impacts encompass:

- Feedback from clinical teams informed by evidence derived from multicenter studies.
- Integration of content and conceptual frameworks in undergraduate and postgraduate training programs.
- Enhancing the dialogue among research, support, and education.
- Contribution to regional dialogues regarding quality of care and collaborative care planning.

**Instead of sudden changes, the impact has been gradual and cumulative, integrating research and practice within a framework of ongoing enhancement.**



# Lessons learned 2019–2025

The analyzed period provides a series of significant insights for the future consolidation of the **Red-InPal** Network.

- First, experience indicates that collaborative research necessitates a stable foundational structure. The flexibility inherent in network thinking does not negate the requirement for methodological coordination, administrative oversight, and the preservation of inter-institutional connections.
- Secondly, participation in international consortia necessitates not only technical and organizational competencies but also diligent and accountable management of the economic and human resources involved. Overseeing competitive funds, adhering to deadlines, coordinating interdisciplinary teams, and delivering transparent reports to funding agencies require specific skills that must be systematically cultivated. The experience acquired from competitive calls for proposals has enhanced these management capabilities, highlighted institutional strengths, and identified areas for improvement in project planning, execution, and monitoring.
- Third, the early training of researchers is crucial for ensuring continuity. Incorporating young professionals into active projects fosters generational renewal and academic sustainability.

Research in palliative care is enhanced by a continuous interdisciplinary approach. The incorporation of clinical, social, economic, and ethical dimensions expands our comprehension of the phenomenon and fortifies scientific contributions.

**Ultimately, networking is strengthened when leadership is decentralized and nodes take on collective responsibilities. The institutional maturity attained between 2019 and 2025 serves as a robust foundation, albeit one that remains subject to enhancement.**



## 2026–2030: Strengthen the platform

The subsequent phase focuses on formalizing the regional platform, establishing a collaborative Latin American registry, enhancing priority research areas, and securing ongoing competitive funding.

The objective is to transition towards a stable regional framework with its own leadership in international initiatives. This forward-thinking perspective inherently prompts a thorough evaluation of the advancements achieved and the institutional insights gained.

### Conclusion

Between 2019 and 2025, the **Red-InPal** Network evolved from an emerging network into a robust regional platform. Beyond individual initiatives, the primary accomplishment was the establishment of a stable collaborative framework characterised by ongoing international integration.

**The challenge for 2026–2030 is to enhance this consolidation, fortify financial sustainability, and broaden regional and international scientific contributions, while maintaining a reflective and critical perspective that facilitates learning from accumulated experiences and adjusting the course as needed.**
